






## TOP SECRET

## The STUFFIE Project





The upper intermediate students have been working on a top secret Applied Design Skills and Technology (ADST) project which was finally revealed this week. They took drawings made by the Kindergarten and Grade 1 students and turned them into stuffies! The stuffie makers tried to stay true to the original picture and had to make many design decisions along the way:

How do I turn a 2D picture into a 3D stuffie?

How big should I make the stuffie?

Which part is background and which part is the creature?

They then had to make a pattern and learn hand sewing skills. For most, this was their very first hand sewing project. As we pointed out to students as they embarked on this ambitious project, "You are going to do a whole lot of work only to give it away!" We hope our youngest students will enjoy these heartfelt gifts.

#### DECEMBER 18-26



Hanukkah, or the Festival of Rededication, celebrates the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem after its defilement by the Syrian Greeks in 164 BCE. Although it is a late addition to the Jewish liturgical calendar, the eight-day festival of Hanukkah has become a beloved and joyous holiday. It is also known as the Festival of Lights and usually takes place in December, at the time of year when the days are shortest in the northern hemisphere.

#### DECEMBER 25

Marking the birth of Jesus, Christmas is a major religious holiday for Christians. For many people it is no longer just a religious festival; it has become a season of general celebration and giving presents. The holiday is officially observed on December 25, but often celebrations begin a few days earlier and last until the new year. It is one of the most colourful and festive times of the year.

One of the beloved customs of the holiday is decorating a Christmas tree with strings of lights and ornaments. The Christmas tree is thought to be the combination of two German customs. The "paradise tree" was a fir tree that was a part of the religious feast day of Adam and Eve, which was celebrated on December 24. In the same room was a wooden "Christmas pyramid." This triangle had shelves that held Christmas figures and was decorated with evergreens, candles, and a star.

### DECEMBER 26-JANUARY 1







Kwanzaa means "first fruits" in Swahili, a language spoken in Africa, and refers to the joy and unity many Africans have when celebrating the harvest season. The holiday encourages people to honor seven principles: unity, self-determination (helping yourself succeed), collective work and responsibility (teamwork), cooperative economics (sharing), purpose, creativity, and faith.

On Dec. 26, millions throughout the world's African community will start weeklong celebrations of Kwanzaa. There will be daily ceremonies with food, decorations and other cultural objects, such as the kinara, which holds seven candles. At many Kwanzaa ceremonies, there is also African drumming and dancing.
